Most Frequently Cited Standards



## Gasoline Stations (NAICS 447)

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) keeps records not only of the most frequently cited standards overall, but also within particular industries. The most recent statistics from OSHA reveal the top standards cited in the fiscal year 2013 for the gas station industry. This top 10 list comprises establishments that retail automotive fuels (e.g., gasoline, diesel fuel, gasohol) and automotive oils or retail these products in combination with convenience store items. These establishments have specialized equipment for the storage and dispensing of automotive fuels.

<b>7. General Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) Requirements</b> - Selecting the correct PPE, providing instruction, monitoring its use and maintaining the PPE to standards.	<a href="#">29 CFR 1910.132</a>	\$2,150
<b>8. First Aid and Lifesaving Facilities</b> - Providing first aid kit and other medical supplies at the workplace in case of an emergency.	<a href="#">29 CFR 1917.26</a>	\$0
